Call to Order

Chairman Brett Murdock called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m.

Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Commissioner Carchio.

Roll Call

Roll call was conducted by the Commission Clerk.

Chairman’s Report

Chairman Murdock welcomed new commissioner Samuel Han and acknowledged outgoing Commissioner Anthony Florentine, who served from 2009 – 2014. Congratulations were offered to Commissioner Xuan-Nhi Ho on his reappointment.

Director’s Report

Director Dylan Wright introduced new staff members, An Tran, Deputy Director of Business Services; Ann Barlow, Manager of Human Resources; and Peter Livingston, Manager of Renewable Energy.

Mr. Wright also informed the group that the Transportation Corridors Agency is sponsoring a community event to recognize the twentieth year of the bio-mitigation program at Coyote Canyon Landfill. The event will take place on Saturday, May 17, from 7:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. It is the first opportunity for the public to be at the Coyote facility. More information will be forwarded as it becomes available.

Also noted were two more awards to the department, the Energy Project of the Year Award from the Orange County Chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers and the Project Achievement Award from the Orange County Engineering Council.

Regarding the Green Building litigation, Mr. Wright reported that the litigation was ongoing, which prevented any comment on the subject.

Action Item Recap:

Commission Clerk Julie Chay provided additional information about the TCAs' open house at the Coyote Canyon former landfill. Commissioners' requests from the meeting of December 2013 have been implemented. These include the addition of the Green Building litigation updates to the Director's Report, the report on the impacts of waste importation and the distribution of the Angels Baseball outreach report to City Managers in the County.

The Commission Clerk will schedule a landfill tour for commissioners. In addition, landfill tours can be arranged at any time upon request. Commissioners were reminded to complete the annual form 700 Conflict of Interest Statement by April 1, 2014.

The imported waste is a small portion of the waste stream, and will not compromise the County's future landfill capacity.

Manager of Recycling and Environmental Programs, Isabel Rios, presented the report, including a presentation on a recent recycling event at the Honda Center, which was well attended.

Agenda Item 2 – *OC Waste & Recycling Third Quarter Financial Report FY 2013/2014 – Alan Yuki, Manager, Budget/Finance*

This report presents the financial status of OC Waste & Recycling for the third quarter of FY 2013/14 (January – March, 2014). Included in the report is financial information related to tonnage, expenditures, revenues, cash, and fund balance/reserves.

System Tonnage

Total OC Waste & Recycling system tonnage received during the third quarter of FY 13/14 was 1,057,038 tons, consisting of 656,204 in-county tonnage and 400,834 importation tonnage versus a modified budget of 3,950,596 tons. Landfill site third quarter tonnage was as follows:

Olinda Alpha Landfill

In-county tonnage	211,654 (32%)
Importation tonnage	282,588 (70%)

Frank R. Bowerman Landfill

In-county tonnage	357,405 (55%)
Importation tonnage	111,739 (28%)

Prima Deshecha Landfill

In-county tonnage	87,145 (13%)
Importation tonnage	6,507 (2%)

Of the 656,204 in-county tonnage received, 24,691 tons (3.75%) was from self haul sources.

Revenues

For the third quarter of FY 13/14, revenue recorded in OC Waste & Recycling's Enterprise/Operating (Fund 299) was \$28,689,384 or 29% versus the modified revenue budget of \$100,240,364. Primary sources of revenue received during the third quarter included:

- \$21,238,923 Sanitation fees (74.3 % of the \$28,689,384 total)
- \$6,108,261 Operating Transfers In (21.3%)
- \$919,359 Royalties (3.2%)
- \$227,108 Other Revenues (0.8%)
- \$105,733 Interest Income (0.4%)

Expenditures

Third Quarter FY 13/14 expenditures and encumbrances recorded in OC Waste & Recycling's Enterprise/Operating (Fund 299) totaled \$22,723,654 or an approximate 19% total versus the modified expenditure budget of \$118,962,129. Capital Project Fund's (Fund 273) expenditures were -\$1,122,106 or -2% of the modified expenditure budget of \$46,201,719. This is due to no

new encumbrance in the quarter and actual expenditures were paid from encumbrances of prior periods.

For the third quarter, OC Waste & Recycling's categories of the largest expenditures included:

- \$6,383,101 Salaries & Employee Benefits (28.7%)
- \$2,758,848 Hazardous Waste Services (12.4%)
- \$2,377,018 Heavy & Light Equipment Maintenance (10.7%)
- \$2,202,418 Fuel & Fuel Pump Maintenance & Equipment (9.1%)
- \$1,716,493 County Cost Applies (7.7%)
- \$1,436,163 Landfill Gas System Maintenance (6.5%)
- \$903,267 Facilities & Building Costs (4.1%)
- \$895,639 Excise Tax (4%)

Cash Balance and Reserves

As of March 31, 2014, the OC Waste & Recycling's Enterprise/Operating Fund 299 had a cash balance of \$115,862,710 and an available reserves balance of \$49,677,130.

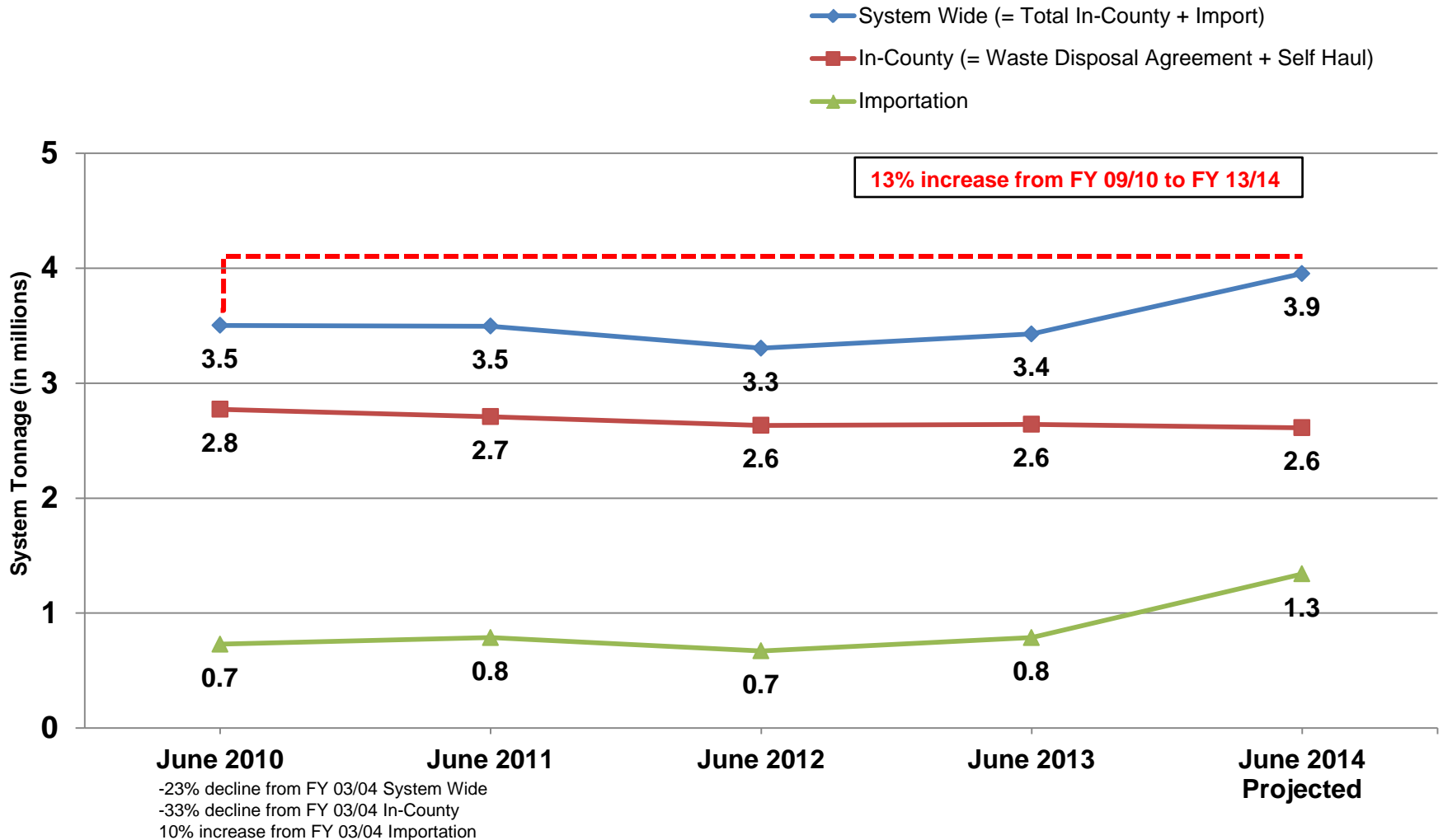

OC WASTE & RECYCLING System Wide Tonnage FY 2009/2010 – 2013/2014

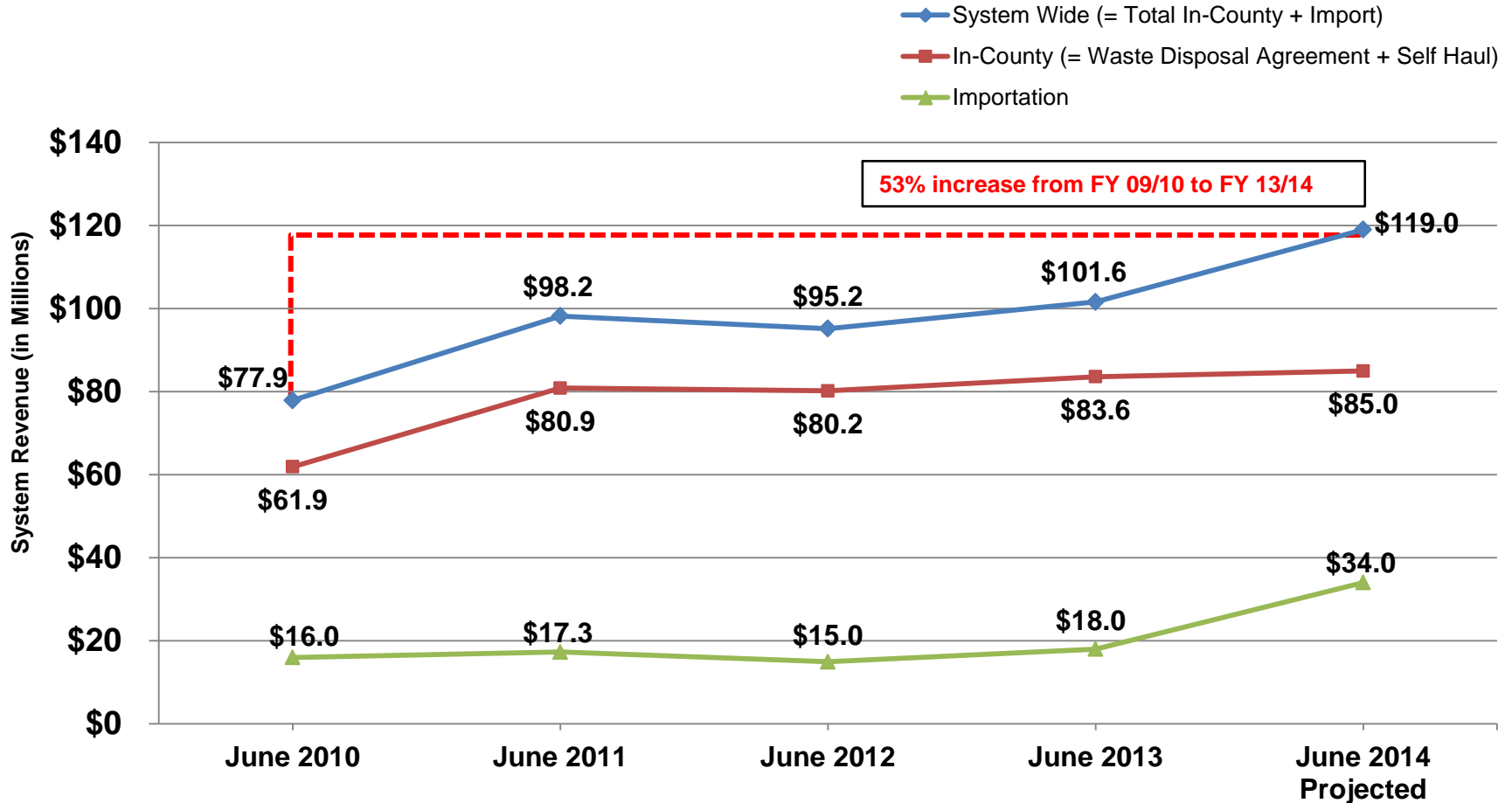

System Wide Revenue (Excluding \$19 Surcharge)

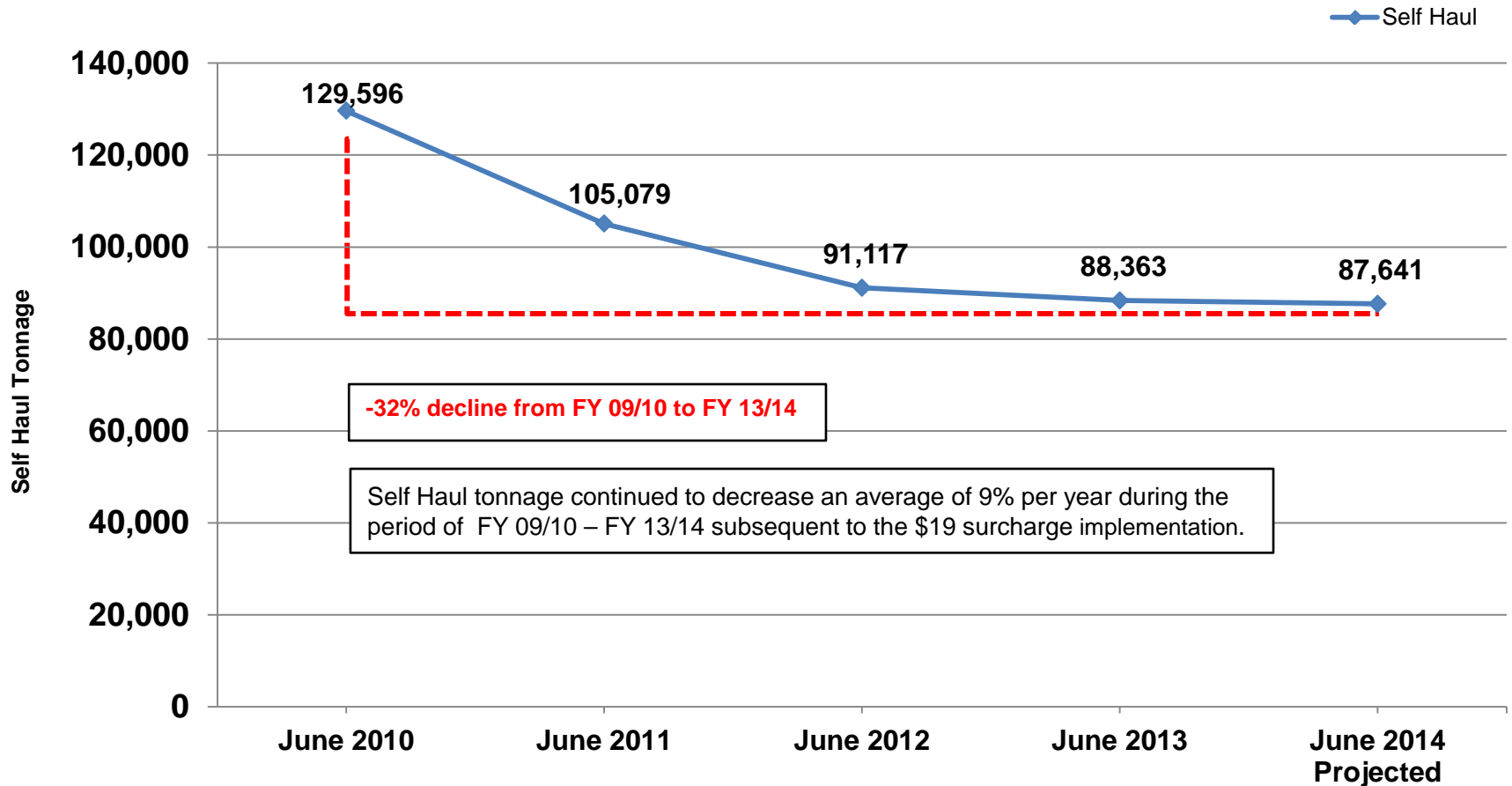

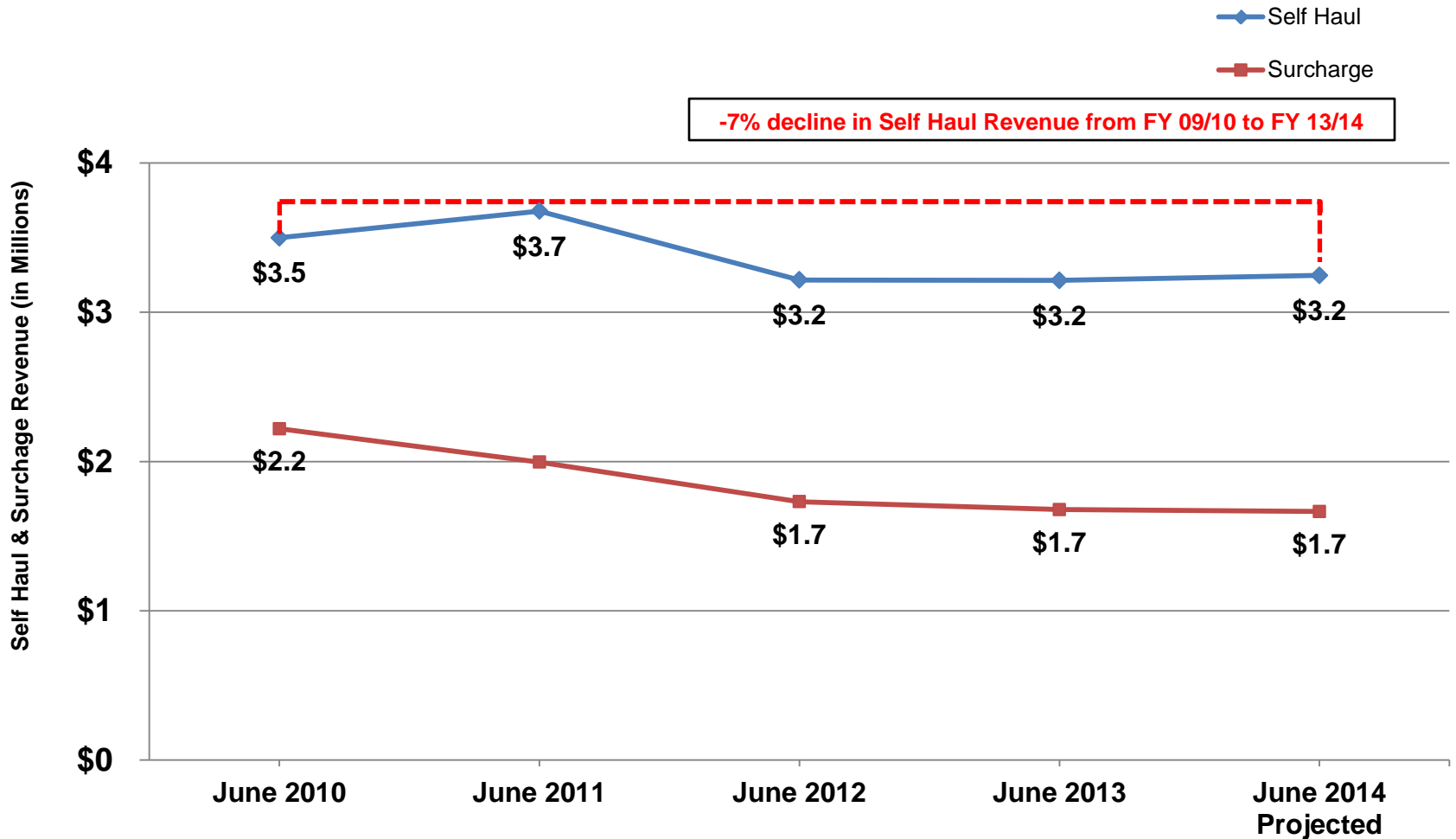
OC WASTE & RECYCLING Self Haul Tonnage FY 2009/2010 – 2013/2014

Agenda Item 3 – *AB 939 Report – Isabel Rios, Manager, Recycling and Environmental Programs*

The purpose of the AB 939 Report is to provide regular updates to the Waste Management Commission on AB 939 programs, projects, and issues of interest.

COUNTYWIDE COMMUNITY OUTREACH PARTNERSHIP PROGRAMS

OC Waste & Recycling (OCWR) and Discovery Science Center (DSC) partnered on developing the Eco Challenge exhibit as part of a mutual goal to educate the general public and encourage them to adopt habits to protect the environment in order to stimulate long-term behavioral change. As an extension of that goal, both organizations have a mutual interest in increasing the number of visitors to the Eco Challenge exhibit, thereby maximizing the educational reach and impact of the exhibit's messages and accelerating behavioral change.

Discovery Science Center Eco Challenge 2014 Annual Report

DSC finalized the 2013 Eco Challenge Marketing Annual Report. It is currently being printed and copies will be provided at the next Commission meeting. The Annual Report includes highlights of the Eco Challenge Marketing elements, partnership with DSC, Angels Baseball, Anaheim Ducks, and Goodwill of Orange County as well as measurable results related to the Eco Challenge.

2014 Eco Challenge Poster Contest

Young Orange County boys and girls between the ages of eight and fourteen (8-14) have the opportunity to participate in the 2014 Eco Challenge poster contest presented by the County of Orange, DSC and Angels Baseball for the chance to be one of five Honorary Bat Kids at a 2014 Angels baseball game. Visit www.discoverycube.org/batkid for contest rules and eligibility. The Eco Challenge Poster Contest started on February 27. Entries can be submitted through June 30, 2014.

Eco Challenge Angels Baseball 2014 Season

On May 4, 2014, the OCWR started the 2014 Angels Baseball Eco Challenge education and outreach community events at the Angels Baseball home games. Promotional items such as Eco Challenge one-child-free admission coupons, OCWR rulers and Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Fact Sheets were given to fans. OCWR is tracking the number of promotional handouts distributed and evaluating interactions with the public to measure the results from this outreach effort. Through face to face interaction with interested Angels fans over the past month OCWR has had the opportunity to promote and inform about the County's four permanent HHWCC's and the Eco Challenge exhibit at the DSC. Eco Challenge Ambassadors are conducting online digital surveys to analyze how much the general public knows about the HHWCC's & the Eco

Challenge exhibit. Fans who took the digital surveys also received Eco Challenge can coozies. The information from these online surveys will allow the County to assess the effectiveness of our outreach campaign at each specific venue.

Rainbow Environmental Services Eco Challenge Earth Day Event HHW Collection Event

On May 3, 2014, Rainbow Environmental Services, Anaheim Ducks and the County of Orange took the Eco Challenge” with the 2013 – 2014 Pacific Division Champions and 2014 Second Round Qualifier for The Stanley Cup, Anaheim Ducks. OCWR, in partnership with the Anaheim Ducks, Rainbow Environmental services, and DSC hosted the Eco Challenge Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collection event in Huntington Beach. The first 100 Cars received four free general admission tickets to DSC and a chance to win an Autographed Anaheim Ducks Puck. Plus the Anaheim Ducks also raffle away a signed autograph Ducks jersey by a mystery player. Orange County residents came and played the Quack-Quack Recycling Quiz for great prizes, and checked out a Rainbow Environmental Services CNG Recycling Truck. A total of 43.50 pounds of HHW materials were collected during this event.

Eco Challenge HHW Collection Event at the Prima Deshecha Landfill

On June 7, 2014, OCWR, in partnership with DSC, Angels Baseball, and CR&R hosted a free HHW disposal at the County’s collection center located at the Prima Deshecha Landfill in San Juan Capistrano. All participants had the opportunity to meet former Angel Adam Kennedy. The first 100 cars to bring hazardous materials for disposal received the opportunity to choose between four free tickets to an upcoming Angels game or four free general admission tickets to the DSC.

The attendees to these two HHW collection events were able to bring HHW materials such as old paint, used oil, pesticides and e-waste to the County’s HHW Collection Center’s for free disposal. All visitors received free battery buckets for safe battery disposal as well as other promotional items, including reusable insulated shopping totes and can coozies—while supplies lasted.

Midway City Community Cleanup Event

Statutes passed in 2014 take effect

The Legislature introduced over two thousand new bills by the February 21, 2014 deadline. OC Waste & Recycling has identified many bills that have potential relevance to the County. The following bills are of most interest (and potentially concerning) to OCWR:

High Watch

Mandatory Commercial Organics Recycling

AB 1826 (Chesbro) - This bill would require businesses to arrange for recycling services of organic waste. This law would be enforced by the local jurisdiction and would allow that jurisdiction to impose fees if necessary to enforce the law. A jurisdiction may require such mandatory recycling through franchise agreements among others. The Air Resources Board has indicated they will initiate rulemaking to ban organics from landfills through their Scoping Plan if no legislation is passed.

Alternative Daily Cover Diversion Credits

AB 1594 (Williams) - This bill would remove diversion credits for green material used as alternative daily cover (ADC) after January 1, 2020.

Regulatory Update

Air Resources Board Scoping Plan

Update- The Air Resources board will consider proposed update on May 22, 2014. The Scoping Plan must be updated every five years. OC Waste & Recycling provided comments on the areas of organics, infrastructure and cap-and-trade.

CalRecycle's 75% Plan- AB 341

directed CalRecycle to develop a plan to achieve a statewide goal of 75%. The plan was scheduled to be presented in January 2014. It is unknown when CalRecycle will submit their report. There is expectation that there will be minor changes from last year's draft plan.

Extended Producer Responsibility/Product Stewardship

AB 1893 (Stone & Eggman) Sharps

Would require all sharps sold to the general public in California to be sold with a sharps waste container approved by the State Department of Public Health.

AB 2284 (Williams & Correa) Batteries

Would require producers of non-rechargeable household batteries to develop and implement a plan to collect and manage batteries sold in CA.

SB 1014 (Jackson) Pharmaceutical Waste

This bill would require CalRecycle to adopt regulations to authorize a participant to establish a program that collects and properly disposes of home-generated pharmaceutical waste.

SB 1274 (Hancock & Correa) Mattresses

Adds a recycler, renovator and authorized solid waste operation to the list of authorized used mattress drop off points, for individuals, at no additional charge. Requires manufacturers, renovators, retailers or distributor that sells a mattress to add a recycling charge to the purchase price of the mattress. This bill is in response to the Governor's concerns of SB 254 with limited scope of CalRecycle regulatory authority and incentives in collecting fines from penalties.

Summary: The California Environmental Quality Act requires the court, if it finds that a public agency has violated the requirements of the act, to issue an order, in the form of a peremptory writ of mandate, specifying what actions by the public agency are necessary to comply with the requirements of the act. This bill would require the peremptory writ of mandate to specify the time by which the public agency is to make an initial return of the peremptory writ of mandate containing specified information. Because a public agency would be required to file an initial return of the peremptory writ of mandate, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The bill would require the trial court, to the extent feasible, to issue a determination indicating whether the actions specified in the initial return and any subsequent return are adequate to comply with the peremptory writ of mandate within 30 days of the filing of the return. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

AB 543 (Campos D) California Environmental Quality Act: translation.

Summary: Existing law, the California Environmental Quality Act, referred to as CEQA, requires a lead agency, as defined, to prepare, or cause to be prepared, and certify the completion of, an environmental impact report on a project that it proposes to carry out or approve that may have a significant effect on the environment or to adopt a negative declaration if it finds that the project will not have that effect. CEQA also requires a lead agency to prepare a mitigated negative declaration for a project that may have a significant effect on the environment if revisions in the project would avoid or mitigate that effect and there is no substantial evidence that the project, as revised, would have a significant effect on the environment. This bill would require a lead agency to translate, as specified, certain notices required by the act and a summary of any negative declaration, mitigated negative declaration, or environmental impact report when a group of non-English-speaking people, as defined, comprises at least 25% of the population within the lead agency's jurisdiction and the project is proposed to be located at or near an area where the group of non-English-speaking people comprises at least 25% of the residents of that area. By requiring a lead agency to translate these notices and documents, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

OC Waste & Recycling Notes: This bill has the potential to become a significant administrative burden by imposing a costly mandate on any project undertaken or approved by the County. CEQA documents are technical and complex in nature. Therefore, any translation requirements could result in a lengthy process and may significantly increase the cost and time needed to prepare the documents since many of the notices may contain multiple pages, as well as maps and other information.

Summary: Existing law requires hazardous waste facilities, including, but not limited to, treatment facilities, to operate under hazardous waste facilities permits or other grants of authorization issued by the Department of Toxic Substances Control. Existing law exempts pharmaceutical neutralization activities from certain requirements of the hazardous waste control laws and certain regulations adopted pursuant to that law if specified conditions are met with regard to the pharmaceutical manufacturing or process development activities, including the management of air emissions and wastes generated as a result of those activities. This bill would require the department, by January 1, 2016, to develop recommendations for standards and guidelines for the operation of onsite waste management and recycling of hazardous waste at facilities engaged in pharmaceutical manufacturing or pharmaceutical process development. Summary: The existing California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989, which is administered by the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery, establishes an integrated waste management program. Existing law requires each city, county, and regional agency, if any, to develop a source reduction and recycling element of an integrated waste management plan. The act requires the source reduction and recycling element to divert from disposal 50% of all solid waste subject to the element through source reduction, recycling, and composting activities, with specified exceptions. Under the act, the use of solid waste for beneficial reuse in the construction and operation of a solid waste landfill, including the use of alternative daily cover, constitutes diversion through recycling and is not considered disposal. This bill, commencing January 1, 2020, would provide that the use of green material, not including materials left over from the composting process, as alternative daily cover does not constitute diversion through recycling and would be considered disposal for purposes of the act. The bill would authorize a jurisdiction that, as a result of these provisions, would not be able to meet certain diversion requirements to apply before that date to the department for one deferral of up to two-years of the application of these provisions. Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery, establishes an integrated waste management program that requires each county and city and county to prepare and submit to the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery a countywide integrated waste management plan. The act requires a business, which is defined as a commercial or public entity, that generates more than 4 cubic yards of commercial solid waste per week or is a multifamily residential dwelling of 5 units or more, to arrange for recycling services. Summary: Existing law, the Medical Waste Management Act, administered by the State Department of Public Health, regulates the management and handling of medical waste, as defined. Existing law specifically excludes home-generated sharps waste, as defined, from the definition of medical waste. Existing law requires all sharps waste to be placed into a sharps container, taped closed, and labeled with the words "sharps waste" or with the international biohazard symbol and the word "BIOHAZARD." Existing law prohibits a person from knowingly placing home-generated sharps waste in certain types of containers and requires that home-generated sharps waste be transported only in sharps containers, as defined, or other containers approved by the State Department of Public Health or the local enforcement agency. Existing law, the Sherman Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Law, requires the State Department of Public Health to regulate the manufacturing, sale, labeling, and advertising activities related to food, drugs, devices, and cosmetics in conformity with the federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act. A violation of the Sherman Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Law is a misdemeanor. This bill would require all sharps sold to the general public in California to

be sold with a sharps waste container that meets applicable state and federal standards for collection and disposal of medical sharps waste. The bill would require the container to be labeled with the words "sharps waste" or with the international biohazard symbol and the word "BIOHAZARD" and would also require specified information to be included on a label affixed to the container or on a separate insert included in the sharps packaging. The bill would not preempt a local ordinance that establishes a mandatory system for the collection of home-generated sharps waste for disposal. Because a violation of these provisions would be a crime, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: The California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006 designates the State Air Resources Board as the state agency charged with monitoring and regulating sources of emissions of greenhouse gases. The act authorizes the state board to include the use of market-based compliance mechanisms. Existing law requires all moneys, except for fines and penalties, collected by the state board from the auction or sale of allowances as part of a market-based compliance mechanism to be deposited in the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund and to be available upon appropriation by the Legislature. Existing law requires the Department of Finance, in consultation with the state board and any other relevant state agency, to develop, as specified, a 3-year investment plan for the moneys deposited in the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund. This bill would create the Community Investment and Innovation Program and would require moneys to be available from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, upon appropriation by the Legislature, for purposes of awarding grants and other financial assistance to eligible applicants, as defined, who submit plans to develop and implement integrated community-level greenhouse gas emissions reduction projects in their region. The bill would require the Strategic Growth Council, in consultation with the state board, to administer the program, as specified.

Summary: The California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006 establishes the State Air Resources Board as the state agency responsible for monitoring and regulating sources emitting greenhouse gases. The act requires the state board to adopt a statewide greenhouse gas emissions limit to be achieved by 2020 equivalent to the statewide greenhouse gas emissions levels of 1990. The state board additionally is required to adopt rules and regulations in an open public process to achieve the maximum technologically feasible and cost-effective greenhouse gas emissions reductions. Pursuant to the act, the state board has adopted the Low-Carbon Fuel Standard regulations. This bill would authorize the state board to establish a very low carbon fuel market commitment program that requires wholesalers, producers, importers, or any other entity that provides transportation fuel to a retailer or sells transportation fuel to a consumer to include as part of their transportation fuel sales in the state percentages of very low carbon transportation fuel, as defined, to be determined by the state board. These provisions would become inoperative 5 years after the state board makes a specified notification to the Secretary of State.

Summary: The California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989, administered by the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery, requires retailers of rechargeable batteries to have in place a system for the acceptance and collection of rechargeable batteries. This bill would enact the Primary Battery Stewardship Act and would define terms for purposes of that act. The act would require, by January 1, 2016, a producer of a primary battery or a primary battery-containing product to submit to the department a primary battery stewardship plan with regard to the primary batteries, or primary battery-containing products, that are sold, offered for sale, or distributed in the state by that producer. The bill would authorize a producer to elect to appoint a primary battery stewardship organization to submit a plan for those batteries or products. The bill would specify procedures for the development of the plan and the elements required to be included in the plan, including providing for a program that would achieve a specified collection rate. The bill would require the department to review the plan and would deem the plan to be approved, unless the department makes a specified notification. This bill contains other related provisions.

Summary: The California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989, which is administered by the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery, requires, among other things, each city and each county to prepare a household hazardous waste element containing specified components and to submit that element to the department for approval. Existing law requires the department to approve the element if the local agency demonstrates that it will comply with specified requirements. A city or county is required to submit an annual report to the department summarizing its progress in reducing solid waste, including an update of the jurisdiction's household hazardous waste element. This bill would require each jurisdiction, subject to those requirements, no later than January 1, 2016, to review its household hazardous waste element and program to determine its effectiveness in the collection, recycling, treatment, and disposal of household hazardous waste, as prescribed. The bill would further require the department, on or before January 1, 2017, to submit a report to the Legislature that analyzes the effectiveness of the state's household hazardous waste management system, including specified information. The bill would require, as a condition of approval of a household hazardous waste element, that the local agency demonstrate that it will give priority to methods that make the recycling and disposal of household hazardous waste more convenient, as defined, for the public. The bill would make changes relating to the annual reporting of a jurisdiction's methods and programs for the recycling and disposing of household hazardous waste. By imposing new duties on cities and counties with regard to the review of its household waste reduction and recycling element, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: The California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 requires rigid plastic packaging containers that are sold or offered for sale in this state to meet, on average, one of specified criteria and defines terms for purposes of those requirements. One criteria that a product-associated or a single resin type rigid plastic packaging container may meet to satisfy this requirement is that it have a recycling rate of 45%. The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery is required to enforce the act's plastic packaging container requirements and a violation of these requirements is a crime. This bill would increase the recycling rate that a product-associated, or single resin type, rigid plastic packaging container is required to meet under this criteria to 75%, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program by changing the definition of a crime. The bill would also delete obsolete provisions and make conforming and nonsubstantive changes. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law, until 2020, requires an operator of a store, as defined, to establish an at-store recycling program that provides to customers the opportunity to return clean plastic carryout bags to that store. This bill, as of July 1, 2015, would prohibit stores that have a specified amount of sales in dollars or retail floor space from providing a single-use carryout bag to a customer, with specified exceptions. The bill would also prohibit those stores from selling or distributing a recycled paper bag at the point of sale unless the store makes that bag available for purchase for not less than \$0.10. The bill would also allow those stores, on or after July 1, 2015, to distribute compostable bags at the point of sale only in jurisdictions that meet specified requirements and at a cost of not less than \$0.10. The bill would require these stores to meet other specified requirements on and after July 1, 2015, regarding providing reusable grocery bags to customers, including distributing those bags only at a cost of not less than \$0.10. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: The California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989, which is administered by the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery, requires each city, county, and regional agency, if any, to develop a source reduction and recycling element of an integrated waste management plan. With certain exceptions, the source reduction and recycling element of that plan is required to divert 50% of all solid waste, through source reduction, recycling, and composting activities. Existing law allows the 50% diversion requirement to include not more than 10% through transformation or "biomass conversion," as defined, if specified conditions are met. The act defines "biomass conversion," to mean the controlled combustion used for the production of heat or electricity of specified materials for the purposes of the act. This bill would

revise the definition of the term "biomass conversion" to mean the production of heat, fuels, or electricity by the controlled combustion of, or the use of other noncombustion thermal technologies on, those specified materials.

This bill would repeal those authorizations, and enact provisions that would authorize the Department of General Services, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, and those local agencies, as defined, to use the design-build procurement process for specified public works. Summary: Existing law, the Used Mattress Recovery and Recycling Act, requires a mattress recycling organization to be established by a qualified industry association to develop, implement, and administer a mattress recycling program, including the development of a state plan by July 1, 2015, for recycling used mattresses in the state that includes specified goals and elements. The plan is required to include an element that ensures that urban and rural local governments and participating solid waste facilities that accept mattresses are provided with a mechanism for the recovery of illegally disposed used mattresses that is funded at no additional cost to the local government or solid waste facility, as provided. This bill would require that element to ensure that urban and rural local governments and participating permitted solid waste facilities and authorized solid waste operations that accept mattresses are provided with the above mechanism. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.
