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## OCSD Traffic Enforcement to run bike and pedestrian safety operation

**SANTA ANA, Calif. (Jan. 20, 2017)** – The Orange County Sheriff's Department will step up Bike & Pedestrian Safety Enforcement Operations on Saturday, Jan. 21 with focused enforcement on collision-causing factors involving motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists.

The department has mapped out locations over the past three years where pedestrian and bike collisions have occurred, along with the violations that led to those crashes. Extra officers will be on duty patrolling areas where bike and pedestrian traffic and crashes occur in an effort to lower deaths and injuries.

Officers will be looking for violations made by drivers, bike riders and pedestrians alike that can lead to life-changing injuries. Special attention will be directed toward drivers speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for signs and signals, failing to yield to pedestrians in crosswalks or any other dangerous violation.

Additionally, enforcement will be taken for observed violations when pedestrians illegally cross the street or fail to yield to drivers who have the right of way. Bike riders will be stopped and citations issued if they fail to follow the same traffic laws that apply to motorists. All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked crosswalks or at corners.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use non-motorized means of transportation. Locally, the Orange County Sheriff's Department has investigated 759 fatal and injury collisions involving pedestrians and bicyclists during the past three years. In 2013, California saw 701 pedestrians and 141 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 28 percent of all traffic fatalities.
